Romanization and Pronunciation:

- This is the romanization system, which will be used to spell the language using the Roman alphabet. I'm going to describe the full system in detail below:
- $A, a$ : Pronounced like the "a" in "father" when stressed only; otherwise it will be pronouncd like the "a" in "sofa".
- $A w, a w$ : Pronounced like the "ow" in "cow".
- $A y, a y$ : Pronounced like the " y " in "sky".
- $\boldsymbol{\not}, \boldsymbol{x}$ : Pronounced like the "a" in "sad".
- B, b: Pronounced like the " $\underline{b}$ " in " $\underline{b}$ ad".
- Ch, ch: Pronounced like the "ch" in "chair".
- $D, d$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{\mathrm{d}}$ " in "diet".
- $D h, d h$ : Pronounced like the "th" in "this" (never like the "th" in "thick").
- $E, e$ : Pronounced like the "é" in "get".
- Ei, ei: Pronounced like the "a" in "gate".
- $\quad F, f$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{f}$ " in "fog".
- $G, g$ : Pronounced like the " $g$ " in "goat" (never like the " $g$ " in "genius").
- $\boldsymbol{H}, \boldsymbol{h}$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{h}$ " in "head".
- $I, i$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{\underline{i}}$ " in "machinne".
- $J, j$ : Pronounced like the " $j$ " in "jam".
- $\boldsymbol{K}, \boldsymbol{k}$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{k}$ " in "kite".
- $L, l$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{1}$ " in "love".
- $M, m$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{m}$ " in " $\underline{m}$ atter".
- $N, n$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{n}$ " in "never".
- $N g, n g$ : Pronounced like the "ng" in "sing".
- $\boldsymbol{O}, \boldsymbol{o}$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{\mathrm{o}}$ " in "tote".
- $\boldsymbol{P}, \boldsymbol{p}$ : Pronounced like the " p " in "pike".
- $R, r$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{n}$ " in "rod". (Note: This is specifically the type of " $\underline{r}$ " found in English.)
- S, s: Pronounced like the "s" in "sad".
- Sh, sh: Pronounced like the "sh" in "shade".
- $T, t$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{t}$ " in "take".
- Th, th: Pronounced like the "th" in "thick" (never like the "th" in "this").
- $\boldsymbol{U}, \boldsymbol{u}$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{u}$ " in "ruminate".
- $V, v$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{v}$ " in "van".
- $W, w$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{w}$ " in "walk".
- $\quad, y$ : Pronounced like the " $y$ " in "yet".
- $Z, z$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{z}$ " n "zebra".
- $\mathbf{Z h}, \boldsymbol{z h}$ : Pronounced like the " $\underline{z}$ " n "azure".
