Noalath Description (One Sentence Version)

Noalath is the Druidic language of *Shannara*. Grammatically it shares things in common with Gaelic, Hawaiian and Arabic, but its sound is closer to Gaelic.

G - always hard like "got"; never soft like "gel"

TH - always soft like "thigh"; never hard like "thy"

Consonants That Differ From English

DH - like "th" in "this" (compare with TH)

LY - like "<u>lli</u>" in "mi<u>lli</u>on"

NG - only like "ng" in "singer" (can occur initially)

NY - like "ni" in "onion"

R - a tap, like "d" and "t" in English "editor"

TS - like "ts" in "cuts" (can occur initially)

ZH - like the "z" in "azure" or the "s" in "measure"

Basic Vowels

A - like "a" in "father", but forward; always pure

E - always like "e" in "get"; never silent

I - always like "i" in "machine"; always pure

O - like "oa" in "boat"; always pure

U - like "<u>u</u>" in "r<u>u</u>de"; always pure

Ö - like "<u>ö</u>" in German "h<u>ö</u>ren"; *always* pure

Ü - like "<u>ü</u>" in German "f<u>ü</u>r"; *always* pure

Other Vowel Notes

At the end of a word, E, O and A are pronounced like the "a" in "sofa".

AI - similar to the "i" in "might"

OA - similar to the "owi" in "mowin""

EA - similar to the "ayi" in "sayin"

ÖA - the sound "<u>ö</u>" followed by the "<u>a</u>" in "sof<u>a</u>"
